More Bras and Bucks, Please!

"Free the Girls" is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that provides job opportunities for survivors of sex trafficking. Gently used bras are collected and donated to the women as a starting inventory for their own business selling bras. In 2014, Free The Girls expanded programs in Mozambique and launched additional programs in new countries, including Uganda and El Salvador. The goal is to reach up to 175 survivors.

Some of you have already read the recent NYS Focus that the collection of Bras and Bucks to ship them is coming to a conclusion at the NYS Conference. To date, AAUW members from across NYS have donated 700 bras. The goal is to collect 1,000 bras. If you have more new or very gently used bras to donate, please get them to Liz Russo before April 23 so that they can be brought to the convention.

Swimathon donations for NCCWSL

Liz Russo has agreed once again to participate in the swimathon at the Convention. This year the funds raised will go to provide a scholarship for a college student to attend NCCWSL (the National Conference for College Student Women Leaders). Registering to Vote is "FREE"

Under the United States law before any citizen can "Freely Vote" in their village, town, city, county, state, or legislative political election they first must be registered within their county at the Board of Elections. There are certain registration requirements that a registrant must fulfill prior to their availability to vote.

There are a number of avenues of how an individual can obtain a "Voter Registration Form"

- Contacting your local Board of Election Office
- On the computer through your State Dept.
- County Agencies: Dept. Motor Vehicle, Dept. Social Services
- Public Libraries, Schools, and Post Office

There is NO COST to the registrant in filing a "voter registration form". The form is written in a non-bias format and will take the registrant only a few minutes to complete. There are two qualifications and a few small sections of information that the registrant must provide on the form prior to filing. The registrant must be a United States citizen and 18 years of age or older. Address, birth date and choice of Political Party along with the registrant signature and date are among the sections on the form.

The next step after completing the "voter form" is to hand deliver the form to the Board of Election Office or mail it through the local Post Office. No faxed or emailed copies will be accepted. Before the next election the new registrant will receive an "Acknowledgment Card" in the mail that will inform the voter of their assigned Polling Place.

On an unrelated note, you may have heard recently about the **Internet security threat caused by the HeartBleed malware bug.** AAUW National patched our servers, including Site Resources, against this vulnerability as soon as a patch was released on Tuesday, April 8, at 8 a.m. We are currently secure against the HeartBleed bug.

We are now in the process of revoking and replacing all of our security protocols (SSL certificates) as a further security measure. The process will be completed over the weekend. The logins for your Site Resources websites remain secure as they did prior to the bug, but they may be updated if you wish on Monday after the SSL certificates are replaced. If you have any questions, please let me know.

As a side note, there is a good article on Mashable (http://mashable.com/2014/04/09/heartbleed-bug-websites-affected/) that provides a thorough list of personal passwords that should be updated in light of the Heartbleed bug. I highly recommend you review this list and personally protect yourselves.

North on Rt 30 out of Vail Mills. Pass Rt 349 that goes to Gloversville, and pass Fuel and Food on the Right. Continue about 1/4 mile and turn Right onto School St. Cross a small bridge, and at 20 mph go up a hill and turn Right at the top of the hill. Go 1/2-3/4 mile, you will go down a hill that has a sharp Left turn at the bottom (you will see docks straight ahead through the trees at the bottom of the hill as you make the turn). PUBLIC POLICY

April 8th marks the day in 2014 that the average woman's earnings will catch up to what the average man earned in 2013. That's ridiculous, isn't it? Why should there be a three month lag in salaries and wages for women? In fact women of color have an even larger discrepancy. In today's economy, this gap just doesn't make any sense. If the pay earnings were equal, there would be a more stable workforce with lower turnover rates and women & minorities & families would have more money to spend on rent, consumer products etc....Basically women would face less hardship making ends meet. And would you believe it isn't even impossible or difficult to correct. Some collective action is in order.

The Equal Pay Coalition NYC and the NYS Pay Equity Coalition are working (and have for years) on leveling the economic playing field for women & minorities & their families. Now, with the help of the Women's Equality Coalition (comprised of over 850 organizations across NY State-including AAUW, YMCA & LWV), the hope is to make major progress on the Women's Equality Act legislation and the pay equity bills that the NY State Assembly has championed and will be passing on Equal Pay Day.

Our local branch of AAUW is committed to raising public awareness that Equity in pay is still an issue. We have contacted 24 local governments urging Mayors & Supervisors to adopt a NY State Municipal Equal Pay Day Proclamation on April 8th. Some alarming statistics offered in the proclamation state that families headed by a

working mother make up nearly 40 percent of low-income families (equal pay could cut poverty rates for women in half) while nearly two-thirds of mothers provide significant family financial support and according to a 2012 AAUW study, college-educated women working full-time over the course of a lifetime earn more than half a million dollars LESS than their male peers. We ask for your help by contacting local & State representatives to remind them that 9 out of 10 New York voters agree that equal pay should be a priority.

Women's Equality Act (WEA) Update

Dear AAUW-NYS Members:

We are officially planning a statewide in-district lobby day for Equal Pay Day, April 8th. On this day (or as close to it as possible), please start making appointments with your Senators (and Assembly, if you have the time Senate is 1st priority since the Assembly has already passed WEA), to bring your regional group in to talk about WEA.

If you have time for one thing in April, make it the Equal Pay Day statewide in-district lobby day.

However, we'd like to really put the heat on from April 1 - 23, while the Senate is on break and Senators will be paying closer attention to what's happening in their district. We would like to see each region set a goal of 2 actions/week during April 1 - 23.

Here are some ideas for actions, which we define broadly as anything that will create visibility for WEA with your Senators:

- ✓ Submit Letter To Editors (LTE) to your weekly and daily papers
 - OpEds are also great if you have a paper that you think might publish an OpEd piece
 - Submit more than one LTE from different folks, on different WEA topics, over the course of April 1 23
 - Ideas for LTE submissions:
 - Equal Pay Day
 - Single Moms perspective
 - Working Moms perspective
 - Human Trafficking April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month
 - The need for all 10 points
 - Local DV/IPV provider on the domestic violence provisions
 - Business Owner on need for work protections
- ✓ Hold a honk-and-wave or other visibility event outside of your Senators office or in a high-traffic area
- ✓ Hold an educational event about WEA or participate in a panel/event where you talk about WEA
- ✓ Participate in a local event with WEA info and postcards
- ✓ Go to a community event where your Senator will be present
- ✓ If you have signed postcards, hand deliver them to your Senators in-district office
- ✓ Bring other groups (not just regional committee) for lobby visits
 - Clergy
 - Business Owners
 - College Students
 - Young Women/People
 - Moms

Again, if you can just do one thing, try to schedule visits to participate in the Equal Pay Day statewide in-district lobby day. Wed really love to have a big impact across the state on that day. I realize it is relatively short notice, so if you need help setting up visits, coordinating, etc, please let me know. Well do what we can to help you succeed!

There was a discussion regarding upgrading the messaging campaign and program for 2014 and revitalizing and revamping our message for 2014, updating the law and creating 10 bills (unified) that has the best chance of passing both houses.

WEA will:

- ✓ Unify the 10 points in the Agenda.
- ✓ Upgrade our laws and messages making messages more inclusive and positive.
- ✓ Emphasis is on passing law in State Senate.

3 Key Messages

- We need to establish our coalition's strength.
- Remind the Senate that we're a state coalition made up of more than 850 organizations.
- Let them know we're not going to give up!

All the issues and measures women face are important and critical.

Every measure deserves a vote.

Woman need to have equality in housing, equality in healthcare and equality in and at work.

We can't let politics stand in the way.

Women give 100%; we expect 100% from our elected officials.

Seven out of ten New Yorkers support the WEA.

We need it! We want it! We deserve it!

The sticky question seems to be reproductive health and freedom. Women in New York must be able to protect their health. We are not trying to expand abortion in NY. New York needs to be in alignment with current federal law. We also need a state law incase federal law changes. The law wouldn't allow a woman to get an abortion unless her life or health is in danger. This would be decided upon by a certified physician. Faith based hospitals and doctors will still have the ability to not provide abortions. The bill also does not allow partial birth abortions. The law about reproductive health belongs with public health law as a medical procedure.

The WEA law also addresses equal pay for comparable work. It addresses transparency, i.e., the ability to enquire about your pay and is in line with the Fairness Paycheck Act, as well as other work related issues that concern women.

Other issues that the WEA addresses are:

- Ending Sexual Harassment
- Stopping Employment Discrimination
- Expanding Access to Justice
- Supporting Domestic Violence Victims
- Fighting Human Trafficking
- Ending Pregnancy Discrimination
- Safeguarding Reproductive Health

April 8th is Equal Pay Day. 8. This date symbolizes how far into 2014 women must work to earn what men earned in 2013. The gap is even larger for women of color. It will be our first lobby day of the year.

Wear RED on Equal Pay Day to symbolize how far women and minorities are "in the red" with their pay!

To spread the message, Letters to the Editor, Op Eds, Outreach to Colleges, On-line Petitions and Postcards will be used.
