Our April Meeting: "The Women of Flame"

FLAME, a group from upstate New York made up of ten people with developmental/physical disabilities including autism, Down's syndrome, and blindness, is capturing the world's attention but their message remains the same. The band from Lexington Center, Fulton County Chapter, NYSARC, Inc., wants to change the world through music. They are a phenomenon that inspires people and changes the way the general public view people with disabilities. People of all ages and backgrounds connect with this special rock band, especially those who have a disability. Parents are often over-

come with emotion watching FLAME, seeing that it's possible to have their child achieve great things and, even more importantly, have a fun, fulfilling life.

FLAME began in 2003 from a recreation program at Lexington www.lexingtoncenter.org.

The plan was to have the band play at the agency and around town. However, the profound effect they have on their audiences made it impossible to keep FLAME within the confines of Fulton County. Word spread and requests for hire began pouring in and FLAME now averages over 70 paid performances per year, including concerts in 12 different states (NY, NJ, PA, Wash DC, ID, MA, ME, VT, RI, IN, CT, TX.) and in Europe. They perform for national and statewide conventions, corporate conferences, civic events, school functions, dances, and private parties. Their song list contains over 100 classic hits, rock, country, and blues songs from the past five decades.

FLAME is now an international touring band in high demand. They have released three CDs, travel on a custom tour bus, and are working on releasing a fourth CD.

Recent events have catapulted FLAME into the national spotlight. Performances at Manhattan's Gracie Mansion for NYC Mayor Bloomberg, being in *People* magazine and being featured on ABC TV's "Good Morning America" has positioned FLAME to greatly expand their scope of influence. As FLAME continues their quest to change the world, their following of adoring fans and grateful parents continues to grow. 12th Sister to Sister Summit Approaches

The annual Sister to Sister Summit for middle school girls is set for Monday, May 16 at FMCC. Each year, for 12 years, volunteers from our Amsterdam-Gloversville-Johnstown branch of AAUW have worked tirelessly to bring this Summit together for young teen girls in our tri-county area. The Summit features fourteen workshops for the girls to choose from during the three morning workshop sessions and a cap-note presentation after lunch. Over 200 girls from 17 schools in the tri-county area are expected to attend.

After lunch, Capnote Speaker Deborah Borie will present the topic "You Decide." Borie will focus on helping girls become aware of how media and advertisers work hard at influencing the decisions young people make in the hope that this information will help girls make good decisions despite the influences that are targeted specifically at them.

In addition, adults attending as chaperones will be offered a tour of the new FMCC clean room led by Greg Truckenmiller the college's Vice President of Academic Affairs.

Information packets have been sent to the 17 middle schools in the tri-county area. The deadline for registration is April 1. There is a registration fee of \$8 for each girl and chaperone attending to cover the cost of lunch and breakfast snacks. Those schools registering girls after April 1 will pay a late fee of \$10 for each attendee.

Nathan Littauer Hospital is graciously funding Borie's presentation and also the printing of the registration brochures and programs for this year's Sister to Sister Summit. Stewart's Shops has donated \$1,000 which will pay for the commemorative t-shirts for the participants. Our branch has also been awarded a \$700 grant from The Montgomery County Youth Bureau. In addition, several area businesses and organizations have also donated to make this program possible. Patsy Suydam and Linda Bumpus are serving as co-chairs of the 12th Annual Sister to Sister Summit. Susan Summerfield and Melanie Pombrio are overseeing registration. AAUW Dorothy Anderson Wemple Literary Award

The AAUW Dorothy Anderson Wemple Literary Award is available to all high school seniors in Fulton, Montgomery, and Hamilton Counties who will be pursuing a 2- or 4-year college degree upon graduation. Students applying will be required to write a three- to fivehundred word essay on the topic "How I Can Change the World." According to Literary Award Chair Rosemary Leo-Pappas, in writing their essays, scholarship applicants are asked to make an honest and candid assessment of their talents and passions now and then project them 10 years ahead and predict how they will develop and utilize those talents and passions to make the world a better place. Entries will be judged on interest, language skills, and knowledge of the subject.

Entries should be submitted to high school guidance departments who along with area English teachers have received information regarding the award. To ensure objective judging, neither the name nor the school should appear on or be included in the essay. A separate sheet with the student's name and school, college they plan to attend, and the counselor's signature should be submitted with the entry. Deadline for the AAUW scholarship application is April 26.

The \$300 award is given annually by our branch in memory of Dorothy Anderson Wemple who was a member of AAUW for over 50 years and a member of our local branch since its inception in 1967. Dorothy Anderson Wemple, who died in 2007, was an English teacher at Knox Junior High School in Johnstown and was a past judge for the essay contest which began in 1991. –Liz Russo There is a \$3 increase in State membership; therefore, dues for the 2011-12 year are **\$69.** Please send your payment to


