We will be discussing the issues surrounding obstetric fistula. You may have been introduced to the topic in the book, The Hospital by the River. If you haven't had a chance to read the book, not to worry, I have purchased a PBS-NOVA awardwinning documentary DVD, A Walk Toward Beautifu" that shows the difficult journey that begins in hopelessness and shame for thousands of women in Ethiopia and ends in a productive new life. The film tells the personal stories of rural women who make their way to Ethiopia's capital, Addis Ababa, to seek treatment. Filmed in a starkly beautiful landscape, the documentary juxtaposes the isolated lives of village women who are outcasts because of their medical condition, with the faraway hospital that offers a miracle after a long and arduous trek—a "walk to beautiful." The film is 56 minutes and we will view as much of it as possible to fit in with our meeting and, hopefully, the ensuing discussion. You will be asked to donate to the Fistula Foundation in lieu of any other donation. Refreshments will be provided.

The women in the documentary are walking to get to the Addis Ababa hospital built by Doctors Catherine and Reg Hamlin who dedicated their lives to women suffering the catastrophic injuries, called fistulae, of obstructed labor. Until the Hamlins began their work in Ethiopia, fistula sufferers were neglected and forgotten--a vast group of women facing a lifetime of incapacity and degradation. Catherine and Reg, with their team of dedicated fistula surgeons, have successfully operated on over 25,000 women, and the Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital has become a major teaching institution for gynecologists from all over Ethiopia and the developing world. -Patsy Suydam

### Heart Health Month and Public Policy

Ok – so let's talk about women's heart health and how it relates to public policy. First a few facts:

- 1) Heart disease is the number one killer of women
- It is estimated that one out of every two women will die from heart disease
- Heart disease kills ten times more women than breast cancer each year, and more than all other cancers combined
- One in ten women aged 45 to 64 already suffers from some form of heart disease
- 5) Nearly one fourth of women who died of heart disease were between the ages of 35 and 44 (Source:

http://www.fathersforlife.org/ health/heartdths.htm)

Now – how do we relate that to public policy? For starters, in addition to making changes in our personal lives we advocate for changes to our community the kind of changes that will improve our way of life and encourage a healthier way of life for all of our relatives, friends, and coworkers. To do that we must not be shy about calling on our elected officials to use our tax dollars effectively by funding the types of programs that will be the most effective in the fight against heart disease. We must remember this:

"Congress determines if and how much of our federal tax dollars go to fund the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute for medical research on heart disease, and if any of these funds get earmarked for research on women with heart disease."

We must make sure that funding continues for heart disease research and prevention programs. We must make sure that our State legislatures take necessary actions to affect our access to healthcare including providing assistance to women with no health insurance, influencing Medicaid eligibility and establishing mandated benefits for routine cholesterol and blood pressure screenings.

I would like to suggest that to promote these efforts the members of our branch do two things during February:

- Write or email your local and State legislators reminding them of the importance of supporting ALL heart health related legislation (contact information can be found in your local newspapers and phone book)
- At our February meeting we all wear red in some form to show our support for heart health advocacy.

Public policy issues mean nothing if the PUBLIC is not proactive. Heart Health – for both sexes – should be high on everyone's priority list. --Helen Martin

### **E-Student Affiliate Initiative**

Our local branch grabbed and ran with the new AAUW initiative: E-Student Affiliate. The program was developed specifically to provide an added incentive for colleges and universities to join or remain AAUW partner members, as well as to provide as many students as possible with free access to AAUW information, research, and advocacy. Thanks mainly to Liz Russo and Trish Isabella, 62 students from FMCC have been enrolled.

We used to hear about AAUW from our colleges or universities and members of our communities. Communication portals are constantly changing. The world of social websites and blogs is now a common avenue for "younger" men and women.

E-student affiliate membership gives access to the AAUW website, including our membersonly online resources such as research, publications, advocacy, leadership training, and project grant opportunities, scholarship and award notifications, and product discounts. Members are eligible to receive electronic copies of AAUW's <u>publications</u> and <u>research</u>. They have access to all AAUW's student leadership resources and benefits; principally, on-line.

Some of the other advantages of E-Student membership are:

1. FREE to all undergraduate students attending an AAUW college/university partner member institution and who do not already have a bachelor's degree.

2. Fifteen percent discount for C/U registration of four or more students to the <u>National Conference for College Women Student Leaders</u>.

3. Upon graduating, the AAUW e-student affiliate receives the gift of a free year of AAUW membership through our <u>Give-a-Grad a Gift</u> program. This gift is compliments of their AAUW C/U partner member at no cost to either the student or to the C/U.

In the near term we will be meeting with as many of the enrolled students as possible to give them guidance in organizing, and helping to ensure that they get as much as possible from their new membership. Who would have thought our branch could even hint that we had over 100 members! Thanks Liz and Trish. We couldn't have picked better recruiters.
