Presidents' Message

As fast as this year has been flying, we should all start to think about what we would like to see our branch do in 2013/2014. We are currently conducting a campaign to raise money for the fistula fund. This is one of the projects that AAUW NYS had started as part of Your Sister's Keeper. We all learned from reading and viewing the video from The Hospital by the River of the great need for these women afflicted with this medical condition. As we get closer to budget time, I will be gathering information on all of our monetary donations. Curl Up With A Good Book -Branch Book Club -February 25

We have several members who are interested in reading books and discussing them. Of the Adelante books listed Baghdad Burning: Girl Blog from Iraq by Riverbend was chosen. Anyone interested in borrowing the book to read should contact Liz Russo who has three copies. We plan to discuss the book over lunch on Monday, February 25 at a place to be announced. Hope you will join us. We are making this a "Branch Lunch Bunch" activity. A summary of the book follows: "In August 2003, the world gained access to a remarkable new voice: a blog written by a 25-year-old Iraqi woman living in Baghdad whose identity remained concealed for her own protection. Calling herself Riverbend, she offered searing eyewitness accounts of the everyday realities on the ground punctuated by astute analysis on the politics behind these events. In a voice that is eloquent, angry, reflective and darkly comic, Riverbend recounts stories of life in an occupied city — of neighbors whose homes are raided by U.S. troops, whose relatives disappear into prisons, and whose

children are kidnapped by money-hungry militias. At times, the tragic blends into the absurd as she tells of her family jumping out of bed to wash clothes and send e-mails in the middle of the night when the electricity is briefly restored or of their quest to bury an elderly aunt when the mosques are all overbooked for wakes and the cemeteries are all full. The only Iraqi blogger writing from a woman's perspective, she also describes a oncesecular city where women are now afraid to leave their homes without head covering and a male escort." --Liz Russo

Miss Fulton County Scholarship Fund

At the December meeting, those attending voted to donate \$50 to the Miss Fulton County Scholarship Fund. It was also decided that, if requested, we will donate the same amount to the Miss Montgomery County Pageant Scholarship Fund.

Fistula Repair Fund - "Filling a Bucket"

At our budget planning meeting last spring, it was decided to continue with the My Sister's Keeper NYS Initiative by once again contributing to the Fistula Foundation as we have for the past two years. Our branch was inspired to begin contributing by reading the book *Hospital by the River*. The book focused on the suffering of women in Ethiopia caused by childbirth injury of obstetric fistula which leads to lack of control of bladder and

bowels and a lifetime of misery and isolation. Women in developing nations often marry early and have children before their bodies are ready. In addition, they do not have access as we do here in the U.S. to hospitals and C-sections that could prevent such injuries.

We began our collection at the December meeting with the goal of \$450 for one Fistula Repair surgery. Donations will be accepted until June. An information sheet and donation form is attached to this news letter. Contributions may be sent to Linda Hammond or brought to a board or monthly meeting to save postage.

At the December meeting, those in attendance voted to take the \$173 microloan we have given twice also as part of My Sister's Keeper and which was repaid and put it toward the Fistula Repair Surgery fund. We thank those who have already donated and appreciate any donations the rest of you may give. We can think of it as a way to "Fill a Bucket" for a woman less fortunate.

Focus on the Future: Reaching for the High Peaks – April 26-28 in Lake Placid

It's time to consider attending the NY State AAUW convention which will be held April 26-28 at the High Peaks Resort in Lake Placid. It promises to be a weekend of inspiring workshops and speakers, good food, and good company. Those attending can get a better idea of what AAUW is all about and make new friends with AAUW members from across the state. Those who register online by March 15 pay a \$45 fee for the entire weekend. Additionally, the cost of a room for Friday and Saturday which includes Friday dinner, Saturday breakfast, lunch, and dinner and Sunday breakfast and lunch are \$504.65 for a single \$350.69 for a double and \$314.14 for a triple. Stop the Spread

Practicing Good Health Habits Can Help Stop the Spread of Flu

Due to a significant increase in cases of flu (mainly Type A-H3N2) in New York State, it is critical to remember the following basic good health habits that can help provide protection from contracting the flu, and help prevent the spread of flu in our community:

- Receive a flu vaccination. This is the best way to protect against the flu.
- Avoid close contact. Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your distance from others to protect them from getting sick too.
- Stay home when you are sick. If possible, stay home from work, school, and public places when you are sick. You will help prevent others from catching your illness.
- Cover your mouth and nose. Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. It may prevent those around you from getting sick. Dispose of the tissue immediately.
- <u>Clean your hands</u>. Washing your hands often will help protect you from germs.

- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.
- <u>Practice other good health</u>
 <u>habits</u>. Get plenty of sleep, be
 physically active, manage your
 stress, drink plenty of fluids and
 eat nutritious food

LAF January Report

The LAF (Legal Advocacy Fund) supports causes that break through barriers for women and girls. Our branch donates money and/or makes baskets to raise money for some of these causes or actions.

Here are some examples of the current causes and actions for which we are working.

*Military Sexual Harassment: The Invisible War, a film about military sexual assault features several AAUW-LAF plaintiffs. It has received an Oscar nomination for Best Documentary after receiving the Audience Award at the Sundance Film Festival. It has also been listed as the 10th movie and only documentary on Time's Top 100 Movies of 2012.

It can be rented from Netflix or purchased on Amazon. AAUW can also host a showing for \$150.

The Invisible War and the lawsuits that AAUW supports have raised public awareness about military sexual abuse. On January 11, The U.S. Commission on Civil Rights held its

2013 Statutory Enforcement Report and Briefing on sexual assault in the military. LAF Program Manager Holly Kearl and Regulatory Affairs Manager Beth Scott attended on behalf of AAUW.

In Congress, the House Armed Services Committee has committed to holding a hearing on this issue in the Military Personnel Committee sometime this month. *Sexual Harassment in Schools: The United Nations accepted AAUW's proposal for a panel on sexual harassment in schools during the 2013 Commission on the Status of Women. This year's theme is "Elimination and Prevention of All Forms of Violence Against Women." Holly Kearl will talk about AAUW's findings and recommendations. The event is open to the public and local AAUW members are welcome to attend.

March 6, 2:30-4:00 at the Salvation Army, 221 E 52nd St in NYC.

Holly Kearl who authored AAUW's 2011 study, Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment at School, will also speak at AAUW groups and local schools in Wisconsin in early February.

Fast Facts

- Fistula used to be present in the U.S. and Europe, but was largely eliminated in the latter part of the 19th century and early 20th century with improved obstetric care in general and the use of C-sections in particular to relieve obstructed labor.
- The World Health Organization estimates there may be as many as 50,000 100,000 new cases of fistula each year, yet the global treatment capacity is less than 20,000 cases a year. There is a large unmet need for treatment. Fistula is most prevalent in sub-Saharan Africa and Asia.
- For example, in Ethiopia, there are an estimated 100,000 women suffering with untreated fistula, and another 9,000 women who develop fistula each year.
- Less than 6 in 10 women in developing countries give birth with any trained professional, such as a midwife or a doctor. When complications arise, as they do in approximately 15% of all births, there is no one available to treat the woman, leading to disabling injuries like fistula, and even death.
- The root causes of fistula are grinding poverty and the low status of women and girls. In developing countries, the poverty and malnutrition in children contributes to the condition of stunting, where the girl skeleton, and therefore pelvis as well, do not fully mature. This stunted condition can contribute to obstructed labor, and therefore fistula.
- But, fistula is both preventable and treatable. For instance, the Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital has treated over 30,000 women over 33 years. Their cure rate is over 90%. Fistula can be prevented if laboring women are provided with adequate emergency obstetric care when complications arise.
