MAY MEETING FOLLOW-UP

At our May meeting we heard a presentation by Linda Horan, Coordinator of Domestic Violence programs for the Family Counseling Center. Horan discussed the "Cycle of Violence" that is the predictable path that a relationship takes when violence is likely to occur. She also discussed the legal and emotional path that victims might take, and she informed our group about the operation of the Domestic Violence Safe House as a haven for victims in Fulton County.

Since the facility depends on volunteer donations for the up-keep and operation of the house, our branch made a Donation of Care to the Safe House. Thanks to all who donated; we contributed \$115 along with household items such as sheets, towels, cleaning products, and kitchen items for the facility.

In addition, HUGS ACROSS AMERICA teddy bears were donated for the children who come to the Safe House. The HUGS ACROSS AMERICA program is a not for profit charity that brings comfort to children in crisis through hugs of teddy bears with messages of hope and care. The local AAUW branch donated to purchase HUGS Bears which were sent to NY City for victims of Hurricane Sandy. The AAUW branch has additional HUGS Bears to be given locally to children in crisis. Students at FM assisted in preparing tags with messages and attaching them to the HUGS Bears as part of an AAUW Student Organization activity.

Domestic Violence was the focus of the NYS AAUW District IV conference motivating our branch to choose the topic for our recent meeting. Anne Campos was in charge of organizing the meeting, and Helen Thomas-James was chair of the HUGS ACROSS America Bears donations.

I'm so fortunate to have a husband who supports me. I sat next to Amanda Jackson-Jacobs and Janice Brown, two of the other Emerging Leaders. We immediately became good buddies and had breakfast together the next morning where we discussed diversity with several other AAUW members.

Attending both this Convention and the Cazenovia Summer Conference was humbling. I met so many intelligent, diverse, compassionate and motivated women. It was a bit overwhelming but also enlightening.

I felt so proud to be a small part of an organization that does so much for women and children and therefore for everyone.

As a delegate I voted at Saturday morning's Business Meeting; then I attended the AAUW NYS Awards Ceremony where the different branches were recognized for their achievements--KUDOS to our branch for all the awards we received.

After the luncheon, I attended the STEM workshop which I found very interesting, especially since I chose (so many years ago) to go into Pharmacy. I believe that girls should be encouraged as much as possible to pursue careers in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. Girls don't have as much exposure to visualization, but by using such tools as pop-up books, origami, cootie catchers, etc. they can learn to develop spatial thinking. The other branch that can be added and perhaps is more interesting to young girls is Design, which makes it STEMD. I found the 3D visualization fascinating.

Since Sunday was our Palm Sunday, we left the convention shortly after the workshop on Saturday but not before bidding on the LAF purses and baskets as well as buying some raffles. The drive home was a little difficult because by then my back was hurting, but I do not regret the trip. I wish I had been able to attend the entire convention. Maybe next year!

FISTULA REPAIR FUND "Filling a Bucket"

To continue with the My Sister's Keeper NYS Initiative, we once again contributed to the Fistula Foundation as we have for the past two years. Our branch initially was inspired to begin contributing by reading the

book Hospital by the River. The book focused on the suffering of women in Ethiopia caused by childbirth injury of obstetric fistula which leads to lack of control of bladder and bowels and a lifetime of misery and isolation. Women in developing nations often marry early and have children before their bodies are ready. In addition, they do not have access as we do here in the U.S. to hospitals and C-sections that could prevent such injuries. We began our collection at the December meeting with the goal of \$450 for one Fistula Repair surgery. At the December meeting, those in attendance voted to take the \$173 microloan we have given twice also as part of My Sister's Keeper, which was repaid, and put it toward the Fistula Repair Surgery fund. In addition, we received a contribution of \$114 raised at the AAUW NYS District IV Conference towards a Fistula repair. As a result we were able to exceed our goal of \$450 and raise \$682 thanks to the generosity of our members and a donation from our April speaker, Joan Monk. At our May board meeting, we wrote a check to the Fistula Fund for \$450 to cover one Fistula repair surgery. In doing so, we joined the Love-a-Sister program. The remaining \$238 will start us off raising enough during our 2013-14 year for another surgery. Again, we thank those who donated. We can think of it as a way to "Fill a Bucket" for a woman less fortunate.

She currently lives in Johnstown, runs a candle business, and is a stepmom to three adult children and a 2 month old granddaughter. An AAUW National Membership will be given to Ackernecht as part of the Give a Gift to a Grad program. She will be also receive a NYS and Amsterdam-Gloversville-Johnstown branch membership. Ackernecht will be honored at the branch picnic at Peck's Lake on June 26 at the home of AAUW member, Maryann Abad.

The AAUW scholarship is given annually in memory of Rita Mary Burke, FMCC English professor and one of the original members of the local AAUW branch. The purpose of the scholarship is to reward women who have had to delay their entry into college after high school to work or raise a family and to encourage them to continue to pursue their education. 
