100th Anniversary of International Women's Day

March 8 marks the 100th Anniversary of International Women's Day (IWD). The day was proposed by Clara Zetkin, the German labor leader, in 1911, in memory of the early campaigns of women workers in the United States who lead the movement of decent working conditions.

IWD was celebrated by hundreds of thousands of European women for the next 60 years. By 1967, women's groups in the US began celebrating IWD and by 1970, due to the growing women's liberation movement, thousands of events were planned across the nation.

In 1980, International Women's Day was used as the focus for the first National Women's History Week in 1980. In 1987, the entire month of March was recognized as National Women's History Month.

Maxine Getty Performance On Sunday, March 13, in celebration of Women's History Month, the Elizabeth Cady Stanton Women's Consortium of which AAUW is a member, will present Maxine Getty's portrayal of Civil War Nurse Mary Ashton Rice Livermore. Although Mary was also an abolitionist, teacher, writer, and suffragist, Maxine Getty will concentrate her performance on Mary's role as a nurse during the Civil War and affiliated with the U.S. Sanitary Commission. Maxine Getty will dress as Mary Livermore would have while nursing in the 19th century and share with the audience the experiences Mary had during her participation in the Civil War.

Maxine Getty has been doing historical presentations for the past 18 years. While accompanying her husband on reenactments, she became interested in living history. Getty's research led her to realize the struggle that many, if not all women, had to educate themselves and become equals in society to men. She was thus inspired to further research and to speak about these struggles and what it took for women to obtain equality.

The performance will take place at the First Presbyterian Church in Johnstown on Sunday, March 13 at 2:30 p.m. Admission is \$5 for adults and \$2 for students.

AAUW Receives Cy Pres Award

AAUW does great work in fighting gender discrimination and now others have acknowledged our fight. AAUW was recently honored to receive a Cy Pres Award of \$23,500 as part of

a judgment in the largest gender discrimination case ever to go to trial. A Cy Pres Award is a way to distribute funds to charitable organizations that promote the interests of the class and that typically conduct activities to discourage the behavior presented in the case.

The class action lawsuit against Novartis Pharmaceuticals Corp. included approximately 5,600 women sales force employees who claimed gender discrimination based on pay promotion and pregnancy. A jury found them liable for gender discrimination in May 2010. In July 2010, the settlement to allocate award funds to the plaintiffs was filed. Judge Colleen McMahon of the US District Court for Eastern NY approved the settlement agreement in November.

AAUW is honored to receive this award as our mission to fight gender discrimination is our main goal. It will be used to support our mission to advance equity for women and girls. To read more, go to:

AAUW has announced the proposed Biennial Action Priorities for Public Policy. They are to:

Support a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity and diversity through equitable funding, opposition to use of public funds for nonpublic education and to charter schools that do not adhere to the same civil rights and standards as public schools, pro-

- tection of Title IX, support and access to higher education for women and disadvantaged populations, increased support for programs that break through barriers for women and girls in STEM fields.
- ♦ Achieve economic selfsufficiency for all women through pay equity, equitable access and advancement in employment, greater availability of and access to a high standard of benefits and policies that promote work life balance, programs that provide women with education. training and support for success in the workforce, strengthening programs to improve postsecondary education access, career development and earning potential, strengthening retirement benefits and programs.
- Guarantee equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse society through protection and access to civil and constitutional rights, choice in determination of one's reproductive life, freedom from violence, increased access to quality, affordable healthcare and family planning, support for U.N. programs that address human rights, freedom in the definition of family and a guarantee of civil rights in all family structures.

Sister to Sister Summit Update

Deborah Borie has been selected as the capnote speaker for the Sister to Sister Summit conference for tri-county middle school girls that will be held on Monday, May 16 at Fulton-Montgomery Community College. Borie currently serves as Project Co-Director of the *Training 2000*+ grant: Just Kids Early Childhood Development Center. She was a speaker at the 2010 NY State AAUW Convention where she discussed the negative aspects of mass media marketing of sex and beauty to young girls.

Borie will present the topic "You Decide" at the Sister to Sister Summit. She will focus on helping girls become aware of how media and advertisers work hard at influencing the decisions young people make. It is hoped that this information will help girls make good decisions despite the influences that are targeted specifically at them.

Borie's presentation is being funded by Nathan Littauer Hospital. In addition, Nathan Littauer Hospital will be printing the registration brochures as well as the day's programs for the Summit. Furthermore, a \$1000 donation from Stewart's Shops will provide t-shirts for girls attending the event.

Sister to Sister Summits are an American Association of University Women (AAUW) initiative and are presented annually across the nation to assist girls in dealing with issues such as stress, self esteem, healthy relationships, bullying, and body image in their difficult transitional years.

This is the twelfth Sister to Sister summit organized by the local Amsterdam-Gloversville-Johnstown branch of AAUW. Co-Chairs of the event are Patsy Suydam and Linda Bumpus.

The local Sister to Sister Summit will feature workshops on topics ranging from internet social networking to dealing with stress. In addition, adults attending as chaperones will be offered a tour of the new Clean Room at FMCC by Greg Truckenmiller, VP of Academic Affairs.

Registration for the Sister to Sister Summit will be handled through area middle schools. Each district will be invited to bring 15 girls to the Summit. Last year's event drew over 200 girls from Hamilton, Fulton and Montgomery counties. Information packets will be distributed to each school district in March. There is a registration fee of \$8 per girl and adult to cover the cost of lunch and breakfast snacks. The deadline for registration is April 1. -Liz Russo

Our April Meeting: "The Women of Flame"

FLAME, a group from upstate New York made up of ten people with developmental/physical disabilities, including autism, Down's syndrome, and blindness, is capturing the world's attention but their message remains the same. The band from Lexington Center, Fulton County Chapter, NYSARC, Inc., wants to change the world through music. They are a phenomenon that inspires people and changes the way the general public view people with disabilities. People of all ages and backgrounds connect with this special rock band, especially those who have a disability. Parents are often overcome with emotion watching FLAME, seeing that it's possible to have their child achieve great things and, even more importantly, have a fun, fulfilling life.

FLAME began in 2003 from a recreation program at Lexington www.lexingtoncenter.org. http://www.lexingtoncenter.org.

The plan was to have the band play at the agency and around town. However, the profound effect they have on their audiences made it impossible to keep FLAME within the confines of Fulton County. Word spread and requests for hire began pouring in and FLAME now averages over 70 paid performances per year, including concerts in 12 different states (NY, NJ, PA, Wash DC, ID, MA, ME, VT, RI, IN, CT, TX.) and in Europe. They perform for national and statewide conventions, corporate conferences, civic events, school functions, dances, and private parties. Their song list contains over 100 classic hits, rock, country, and blues songs from the past five decades.

FLAME is now an international touring band in high demand. They have released three CDs, travel on a custom tour bus, and are working on releasing a fourth CD.

Recent events have catapulted FLAME into the national spot-

light. Performances at Manhattan's Gracie Mansion for NYC Mayor Bloomberg, being in *People* magazine and being featured on ABC TV's "Good Morning America" has positioned FLAME to greatly expand their scope of influence.
