Co-President's Message

Halloween is past, Election Day is behind us and we are on to Thanksgiving and the holiday season! As the weather gets colder and the days shorter, we hope you will bundle up and come out to the events AAUW has planned for the coming months.

Our next AAUW offering is on Saturday, November 16 at 2pm at the Glove Theater. Thanks to the efforts of Carol Cownie, we will be partnering with the Mohawk Harvest Cooperative Market in an educational community outreach program. We will be showing the movie, "A Place at the Table", regarding the stereotyping of hunger. A brief panel discussion and question and answer period will follow. There is no admission charge and the public is invited and encouraged to attend. Instead, we ask those attending to bring jars of peanut butter (or peanut butter substitute) and jelly or monetary donations to the local food pantry. At the time we decided to offer this program, we had no idea how timely it would be. As of November 1, the food stamp program (known as SNAP) was cut by \$5 billion dollars. The cut is a result of the expiration of the temporary \$5 billion per year boost in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP. The extra funds were originally added in 2009 as part of the stimulus act during the severe recession. Funding for SNAP is part of the farm bills being debated in Congress. Starting November 1, a family of four will lose \$36 per month; or \$29 for a three-person family. As a result of the SNAP reduction, already depleted private food banks, food pantries and soup kitchens are expected to see increased demand from people trying to put food on their tables. Thanks to the effort of Helen James, the Student Council at the Johnstown High School partnered with AAUW to make cash

and peanut butter donations to the local food bank in conjunction with our upcoming showing of "A Place at the Table".

Looking back, we had a wonderful October meeting focused on the culture of Jamaica with a follow-up at FM the next day. We were so fortunate to have Jackie Goffe-Mcnish travel from Poughkeepsie to speak to us. The Jamaican food prepared by Nicoy Pusey and Chartwells was enjoyed and declared authentic by Jackie and her husband who is Jamaican. As we also celebrated United Nations Day. It was interesting to see the flags our members brought to the meeting representing their heritage. We are as Jackie said "Out of many, one people". Like a salad with many ingredients each of us still retains our own identity and parts of our heritage. On November 20 our Branch Bunch Book Discussion group will meet at 6pm at the Johnstown Public Library to give those members who work a chance to join us.

In celebration of Native American History Month we will be reading, <u>Ride the Wind: The Story of Cynthia Ann Parker and the Last Days of the Comanche</u> by Lucia St. Clair Robson, the AAUW Adelante book for November. Since there are limited copies of *Ride the Wind* available through the Mohawk Valley Library System, we have also reserved for discussion, *Kateri of the Mohawks* by Marie Cecili Buehrle. At our October meeting, we discovered that we have AAUW members who have Native American heritages. We hope they will join our discussion and share some stories. We hope to share some samples of foods Native Americans ate as well!

Looking ahead to the holiday season, we welcome you to join our Branch Lunch Bunch in attending the Festival of Trees at the Century Club in Amsterdam on December 2. Last year we also invited friends and relatives who were non AAUW members to join us for lunch and friendship and to enjoy the decorations and musical entertainment offered.

On Saturday, December 7 the branch will celebrate with a luncheon and entertainment by harpist Nancy Walko at Parillo's Armory Grill in Amsterdam. At the meeting, we will accept donations to the Fistula Repair Fund as we continue to reach out to help women with child-birthing related injuries in countries that do not have readily available obstetric care.

If you would like some reading after the holidays, check out "Language of Flowers" by Vanessa Diffenbaugh. The book deals with children who age out of foster care. That will be the topic of the January 13 branch dessert meeting at the Johnstown Public Library which is being organized by Women's Issue Chair Carol Cownie.

Our branch programing continues to focus on understanding not only the diversity of cultures, but also socioeconomic groups. We welcome you to join us, to learn and have fun! *Co-president Liz Russo*

New York State applied to National for a State Organizer. We are very happy that our application was accepted. Our new State Organizer is Kimberly Hayes Pollard. Kimberly will work in Region 1 (Maine, New Hampshire, and New York).

National developed this state pilot program as a way to create a better connection between the branches, states, and national- and to ensure that you have access to the full arsenal of resources national has to offer. I can tell you that, while this role is still new to me, I have immersed myself in everything AAUW over the last several weeks, and I am still finding new advocacy tools, public policy resources, or reports that I hadn't seen before- there is some great information here! So I am here as a resource to help you (as members) accomplish

your goals. "A Place at the Table", the 2013 movie regarding the stereotyping of hunger and what it is really like to be hungry in America will be shown at 2pm on Saturday, November 16 at the Glove Theater in Gloversville. Our branch is partnering with the Mohawk Harvest Cooperative Market to offer the movie to the public as part of our education and outreach efforts.

Admission to the movie is free, but those attending are encouraged to bring jars of peanut butter (or substitute) and or jam which will be distributed to area food pantries. Cash donations to the food pantry will also be welcomed.

Following the hour and a half film, AAUW will host a short panel discussion. The panel will include: Dr. Phillip James, pediatrician; Crystal Stewart from Cornell Cooperative Extension; and Elizabeth Blodgett, nutritional outreach coordinator for SNAP.

Hunger in America is a multi-faceted crisis and a threat to the nation's public health. The film "A Place at the Table "exposes the challenges the nation faces as well as some innovative solutions to the problem of food insecurity. Project 2020 Presentation to 5th graders

Project 2020 focuses on the 100th celebration of the passage of the 19th amendment giving women the right to vote. We had hoped to prepare a brief lesson to share with 6th grade students who will graduate, turn 18 and be eligible to vote for the first time in 2020 - a presidential election year. The opportunity arose to give the "5 minute" talk to a group of elementary school when Darcelle Winchell alerted us that students from Boule-vard School would be touring FMCC recently. She had hoped that the Student Organization could speak to the group. We were unable to arrange for the FM Student Organization to present. However, I had an opportunity to meet with the Boulevard students right before they got on their bus. Since this was a 5th grade class, they will graduate in 2021 and turn 18 in 2021 (for the most part) although 3 or 4 will turn 18 in 2020 and be able to vote then. A brief question and answer time with the students determined how many knew about the 19th amendment giving women the right to vote, the date of Election Day, who Elizabeth Cady Stanton was and that she was born in Johnstown. The suggested script shared at our October meeting was also given to the Boulevard teachers along with copies of our AAUW membership brochure so that they knew who we were. Hopefully we can do more with the Class of 2020 in the future.

District IV Meeting in Review

"Diversity in Programming"

We had a beautiful fall day for a ride to Poughkeepsie. There was a choice of 3 workshops to participate in. Dr. Nada Halloway spoke on Ethnicity, Dr Cathy Collins spoke on Gender and Jacqueline Goffe-McNish spoke on Culture. I attended Dr Halloway's workshop and learned that Culture and Ethnicity are interchanged. In conducting diversity programs we were advised to just open it up to all. They, the participants, will bring in their culture/ethnicity into the program. We all bring different things to the table. In 30-40 years from now we probably won't be having this discussion. Today's generation doesn't see the difference. With today's technology they are becoming global learners, and are more connected with the world.

After lunch we all broke away into small groups to discuss what we had all learned from the workshops. The small groups were mixed with participants from all 3 workshops. The facilitators guided us from grouping together into the same group that was in our workshop. This opened up discussion on the 3 topics and how we could bring them into our program. A common factors was "having fun" and "food" were key to a good program.

Betty Herrel walked us through Poughkeepsie's "Leading To Reading" program. Their committee makes reading kits for all age groups. The kits are very simple to make. You use a large zip lock bag decorated with stickers, place a paper plate inside for drawing/writing on, small box of crayons, and a couple of books for a designated age group. Inside the books are labels containing a message to the parent along with discussion questions that can be used after reading the book. Each book also has a sticker noting that the book was donated by AAUW. This committee also collects slightly used books for donations to the shelters. I will bring the kit to the Board meeting and to the December meeting so you all can see what the program looks like. Our branch donated some books which I brought with me and we used in the kits that were made. Most of the kits put together at the district meeting were going to be added to the program's collection.

AGJ also donated some slightly used to new bras for Joan Monk's Free the Girls campaign. Joan had noted that AAUW NYS really came through with donations. Joan's contact at Free the Girls was overwhelmed with the volume. Joan is still collecting bras if anyone missed out on our collection. 
