On Equal Pay, It's Deja vu All Over Again! Message From Lisa M. Maatz, Vice President of Government Relations

I'll be honest: The Senate is giving me a bad case of whiplash.

Six days ago, for the first time ever, 73 senators from both parties voted to have a debate on the Paycheck Fairness Act, a much-needed bill that would help close the gender pay gap.

And then, last night, nearly 20 of them turned right around and <u>blocked the bill</u> from moving out of the debate phase and onto a final up-or down vote.

This was no last-minute change of heart: It's the same partisan bickering and abuse of procedural rules that we've seen time and time again. This time, the gridlock stings even more than usual because we're just two days away from the U.S. Census Bureau releasing new data about the gender pay gap.

Honestly, we're not holding our breath that the new data will show a huge decrease in the gender pay gap. While that would be terrific, the pay gap between men and women has held steady for the last decade and shows little sign of going away without some serious changes in both federal law and social attitudes.

What really gets me is that we've got a gender pay gap that hasn't budged in more than 10 years, and a Senate that refuses to vote on legislation that could make a real difference in finally shrinking that number.

Your senators need to hear how you feel about their votes:

- If they supported the bill, <u>thank them for standing for women</u>, and strengthen their resolve to keep fighting for fair pay.
- If they chose gridlock over real change for women and working families, <u>make sure they know how wrong they</u> <u>are</u>.

We need the Paycheck Fairness Act to bring the Equal Pay Act of 1963 into the 21st century. The Senate's failure to end Madmen era policies has significant, real-world implications for millions of American women and their families.

The Census data coming out later this week is expected to say what it always says: Today - in 2014! - women face a gender pay gap at every education level and in every occupation, and the gap is worse for mothers and women of color.

Even when comparing "apples to apples" and controlling for all factors known to affect earnings, AAUW researchers still

found a 7 percent unexplainable pay gap between men and women just one year out of college – and 7 percent is no small change.

Gender pay discrimination isn't a myth; it's math. And the wage gap isn't just a number. It represents real dollars and cents that translates into less money for food, gas, housing, education, child care... the list goes on. All workers deserve the chance to succeed, and hard work deserves equal pay. It's just that simple. It's not a partisan issue, and it shouldn't be. It is simply the right thing to do.

<u>Make sure your senators know you were watching the Paycheck Fairness Act vote!</u> They need to know that this issue isn't going away – and that we are certainly not going away either.

American Fellowships

Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research full time, or preparing research for publication for eight consecutive weeks **Funding:** \$6,000–\$30,000 **Deadline:** November 15

Career Development Grants

Who may apply: Women pursuing a certificate or degree to advance their careers, change careers, or re-enter the workforce and whose bachelor's degree was received at least five years before the award period Funding: \$2,000–\$12,000 Deadline: December 15

Community Action Grants

Who may apply: Individuals, AAUW branches and states, and nonprofit organizations to fund innovative programs or nondegree research projects that promote education and equity for women and girls **Funding:** One-year grant, \$2,000–\$7,000 Two-year grant, \$5,000–\$10,000 **Deadline:** January 15

International Fellowships

Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time graduate or postdoctoral study in the United States who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents
Funding: \$18,000-\$30,000

International Project Grants

Who may apply: Alumnae of AAUW's International Fellowships program who are living in their home countries and pursuing community-based projects to improve the social advancement and economic empowerment of women and girls **Funding:** \$5,000–\$7,000 **Deadline:** December 15

Selected Professions Fellowships

Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time study in a master's or professional degree program in which women are underrepresented, including STEM, law, business, and medicine Funding: \$5,000-\$18,000 Deadline: January 10

Legal Advocacy Funds (LAF)

Where does the money go that our branch donates to the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF)? It provides support for victims of sexual discrimination, harassment and assault with occur at their place of employment. Examples include Lilly Ledbetter's quest for equal pay at Firestone Tire and sexual assault cases in the US military. Grants from LAF can also be applied for to provide education about gender discrimination in the workplace Here is an example:

It's time to apply for a Campus Outreach Grant! These grants support programs that teach college students about gender discrimination in the workplace or in education. You could use the grant to bring an equal pay expert to speak on campus, to help students lobby for more-just campus sexual assault policies, or to play an AAUW public service announcement and hand out information about <u>Title IX</u> at a campus sporting event.
