#### The AGJ Branch Presents at the AAUW NYS Summer Convention, July 20-22, 2012

On July 20-22, 2012, six members of the AGJ branch – Linda Hammond, Liz, Russo, Catherine Julius, Sonnet Gravina, Anya Biel, and Darcelle Winchell – attended the New York State Summer Conference at Cazenovia College. This conference provided an excellent opportunity for AAUW networking, sharing of ideas, and brainstorming for activities for the upcoming academic year.

On the third day of the conference, Liz Russo, Sonnet Gravina, Anya Biel, and Darcelle Winchell gave a presentation on the College Connection. In 2011, the year that marked the 130<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of AAUW, the AGJ branch gained a new member: Fulton-Montgomery Community College. FMCC became the third (out of thirty-one) community colleges in New York State to join AAUW. With FMCC as an AAUW college partner member, all full-time FMCC students can receive free national AAUW e-student affiliation.

By July 2012, the number of FMCC e-student affiliates has grown to over 50, in large part, because of the tireless mobilization effort of the branch president Liz Russo, FMCC faculty members Sonnet Gravina and Anya Biel, and the enormous support of the FMCC administration, in particular, Vice President for student affairs Jane Kelley and Secretary to Vice President for student affairs Darcelle Winchell.

In May 2012, AAUW partially sponsored one of the distinguished FMCC graduates, the recipient of the Chancellor Award and former President of the Student Government Association, Marie Thomas, to attend the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders

(NCCWSL) in Washington D.C. Marie Thomas, who will be starting her first year at the College of St. Rose in the fall of 2012, will be returning to FMCC on September 25<sup>th</sup>, this time as an honored guest speaker at the AAUW membership meeting.

Starting September 2012, FMCC will have its own AAUW Student Organization on campus with Sonnet Gravina and Anya Biel as its advisors. Among the goals of this newly formed organization are the support of student leadership (including FM students' attendance at NCCWSL), education of students and community members about issues such as sexual harassment, empowering students to lobby for legislative change on issues important to them, forming partnerships with other clubs at FM, and supporting the establishment and continued growth of a STEM club at FM.

### 2012 Olympics and the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Title IX

What do Gabby Douglas, Allyson Felix, Serena Williams, and Missy Franklin have in common? They were part of the 269 female athletes representing the United States in the 2012 London Olympics, and they have always had Title IX to support them. This was the first time in

US history that the total number of women on the US team outnumbered the men 269 to 261. US women won more total medals than men (58 to 45) and more gold medals (29 to 17). "With women's participation at a record level, these Olympics are being hailed as a gender-equity milestone." - David Wharton for the Los Angeles Times

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 provides that "No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any educational program or activity receiving federal financial assistance." This means that all federally assisted educational programming must have equal access to academic programs, college scholarships, sports, and team equipment, coaching, and facilities.

"Four decades after the passage of Title IX, U.S. Olympic officials credit the federal gender-equity law for encouraging girls to play sports in school and broadening the talent base from which national coaches can recruit." –David Wharton for the Los Angeles Times

So after 40 years, can we claim that Title IX is responsible for the growth in producing such competitive female Olympians? Well, let us first acknowledge that "a significant number of the medals won by U.S. women came in sports that the NCAA doesn't sanction and few if any high schools offer, including ju-

do, cycling, and shooting" -Rachel Larimore for Slate. But there is no doubt that Title IX has nurtured our culture to be an encouraging environment for women in whatever sports they choose to pursue. The opportunities and experiences that Title IX gave these female athletes were the foundation on which they built their personal dedication and commitment to become the elite Olympians of 2012. Scott Blackmun, chief executive of the U.S. Olympic Committee stated, "I think that Title IX really gave us a head start because of the national commitment to make sure that young women are getting the opportunity to be involved in sports."

"Title IX hasn't been perfect: there is still a significant participation gap between male and female athletes in America's high schools and colleges, and there is a funding gap too. As women's sports have become more prominent, the number of coaching jobs occupied by females is at historical lows. And the sports world is far from equal in the way women are treated and portrayed by the media."-Travis Waldron for *Think Progress* 

The policy is in place, and "By endorsing a broad interpretation of Title IX at crucial moments over the years, the Supreme court has played a critical role in making that law the powerful force for women's advancement (most famously in athletics, but not limited to the playing field)

that it is today." – Linda Greenhouse for *The New York Times* 

Clearly there is work to be done. Please support our Legal Advocacy Fund, which helps women across the country take legal action to defend our rights to equal access. We can also help through the LAF Campus Outreach Program. AAUW branches and members can receive up to \$750 in funding to implement a gender equityfocused program or event at their local college or university. Topics for campus outreach may include: sexual harassment and assault on campus, equal pay and preparing for the workplace, Title IX in the context of athletics or women in nontraditional fields, and tenure issues for fac-

### Summer of 2012 Notable for Women

As the summer of 2012 rapidly draws to a close, all of us should reflect on two notable occurrences. Each of these could never have happened without the continued efforts of all of the women (and men actually) who have worked tirelessly over many, many years to further equality of women in all aspects of their lives and livelihoods.

First, as Congresswoman Louise Slaughter (D-NY) reflects:

Now that the London Olympic Games have drawn to a close, we can step back and marvel at the success of our American women in these games. For the first time ever, the United States sent more female athletes to the games than male, and on the flight home, women wore 29 out of the 46 gold medals won by Americans.

These achievements are a remarkable change from decades past, and a testament to the progress that has been made in the fight for women's equality. Title IX, the landmark legislation that outlawed discrimination in federally funded education programs - including sports - was enacted in 1972. Looking back to the Olympic Games that occurred that same year, we can see just how far we have come. • In 1972, there was no women's basketball event at the Olympics. In 2012, the U.S. women's basketball team won their 5th consecutive gold medal--something that has never been done by any

team in the history of the Olym-

pics.

• In 1972, women's water polo, women's rowing, women's cycling, women's boxing, and women's judo did not exist. In 2012, U.S. women won gold in all of these events.

Yet, despite our incredible progress over the years, we still have more work to do. As I write, young women in high school currently receive 1.3 million fewer opportunities to play sports than young men, and this gap is increasing.

The problem stems from a lack of transparency and accountability in our high schools. Because of this lack of transparency, we are seeing fewer and fewer high schools realize full equality for male and female athletes, and more young women being denied the opportunity to realize their full potential both on and off the field.

So while we all bask in the success of our female Olympians we must remember that there are still obstacles to be addressed and surmounted before the playing field can be considered "level."

Secondly, and on a more poignant note, is the recent passing of Sally Ride, America's first woman astronaut. The efforts that made it possible for Sally's ride into space were beyond compare – especially considering that initial efforts to enable women to be a part of the space program began in the 1950s only to eventually be squashed by Lyndon Johnson who felt that "space is no place for women." Hopefully those of you who were branch members in 2010 will remember our guest appearance by Wally Funk who was one of the original Mercury 13 women astronaut candidates. Wally regaled us with many stories from her training for the Mercury 13 program – up to and including the revelation that not

only she but many of the others scored higher than some of the male astronaut candidates on the same tests.

American politics and politicians are more frequently being held accountable for their stance on equality of women in jobs, education, sports, and healthcare. Our job is to keep the pressure up and use whatever opportunities we can to demand that level of accountability and action. Our job is to honor women like our Olympians, Sally Ride, and the other women astronauts by demanding that the playing field be "leveled" in all aspects of women's lives.

With that in mind and in recognition of the upcoming 192nd Anniversary of Equality Day on August 26, I would encourage each and every one of you, regardless of party affiliation, to exercise your right to vote – the right that was obtained for you by the tireless efforts of our suffragist sisters. I also charge you with the responsibility to encourage all of your female children, grandchildren, friends, and relatives who are not already registered not only to do so but and more importantly – to exercise that right and VOTE!

### **Educational Opportunity Fund** (EOF) News

In the 2012-13 academic year, AAUW is providing more than \$4.3 million in funding for more than 278 fellowships and grants to outstanding women and non-profit organizations. Here in

New York State, 31 AAUW Fellows are studying at colleges and universities during this academic year.

Fellowship and grant recipients undergo a highly competitive selection process. Academic excellence, commitment to improving the human condition, and the promise of continued impact are cornerstones of the rigorous criteria. Community Action grants provide funds to individuals, AAUW branches, and AAUW state organizations as well as local community-based nonprofit organizations for innovative programs or non-degree research projects that promote education and equality for women and girls. Application deadline: January 15, 2013.

One-year CA grants provide funding for community-based projects. Topic areas are unrestricted, but should include a clearly defined activity that promotes education and equality for women and girls. The funding period for a one-year grant is July 1, 2013 – June 30, 2014.

Two-year CA grants provide start-up funds for new projects that address the particular needs of the community and develop girls' sense of efficacy through leadership or advocacy opportunities. Topic areas are unrestricted, but should include a clearly defined activity that promotes education and equality for women and girls. Funding for a two-year grant is July 1, 2013 – June 30, 2015.

American Fellowships support women doctoral candidates

completing dissertations or scholars seeking funds for post-doctoral research leave from accredited institutions. Candidates must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents. Candidates are evaluated on the basis of scholarly excellence, the quality and originality of project design, and active commitment to helping women and girls through service in their communities, professions, or fields of research. Application deadline: November 15.

Career Development Grants support women who hold a bachelor's degree and are preparing to advance their careers, change careers, or re-enter the work force. Primary consideration is given to women of color and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields. Funds are available for tuition, fees, books, supplies, local transportation, and dependent care. Application deadline: December 15.

Selected Professions Fellowships are awarded to women who intend to pursue a full-time course of study at accredited U.S. institutions during the fellowship year in one of the designated degree programs where women's participation traditionally has been low. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or perma-
