By GPS: 214 Lakeside Dr. Mayfield, NY

Otherwise:

North on Rt 30 out of Vail Mills. Pass Rt 349 that goes to Gloversville, and pass Fuel and Food on the Right. Continue about 1/4 mile and turn Right onto School St. Cross a small bridge, and at 20 mph go up a hill and turn Right at the top of the hill. Go 1/2-3/4 mile, you will go down a hill that has a sharp Left turn at the bottom (you will see docks straight ahead through the trees at the bottom of the hill as you make the turn). Go about 1/10 mile; turn Right into the yacht club. Park in the guest parking lot behind the big reddish-orange barn. Walk in the back door of the clubhouse, the kitchen is right there.

4 hours in the life of a Brand-new Lobbyist by Jennifer Garren

An email mentioning Lobby Day for the Women's Equality Act (WEA) was sent to me. I thought it was asking for women to show up and be present and accounted for...kind of like the more, the merrier....so I quickly asked if our resident lobbyist, Bev Alves, intended on going....if so perhaps I'd tag along. This is something I always wanted to do and I certainly want to be more active politically... (the last time I did something this political was 30 years ago). I was in luck. Bev signed on and would walk me through it. I shared with her my novice status and that pretty much I would be her shadow. (which is kind of fun if you know what we both look like...for those who don't....I tower over her.)



So we arrive at the designated area and sign in. We put our Rosie the Riveter sticker on our shirts. We receive our two signs. Equal Laws = Equal Lives was my favorite one. People were being asked to do different things. I was asked to stand outside the legislative chambers and raise the signs to all who passed. I held up my signs trying to make eye contact and smiling to everyone. Several clergy went by and they all gave me a thumbs up. Later on I found out they represented Concerned Clergy for Choice, one of the very many groups who were present and accounted for during this lobby day. Other women including our Bev (the more seasoned veterans)

were off lobbying senators & legislators in an up close and personal way.

After an hour or so, Bev & I returned to the meeting place and accompanied Kim Pollard, AAUW Regional Field Organizer on an AAUW fact finding task. We tagged along and went to three senator's offices. Kim was able to leave a message for each of them. AND THEN we needed to get to the press conference.

Many, many women & men spoke eloquently on why NY State needs to pass the Women's Equality Act. Cameras were rolling and women were cheering. I was cheering and holding up my signs when I saw Mary Lou Davis, AAUW NYS President across the room. I went to join her. Bev was already there. AAUW was well represented. For 7-year-old Raami, the shattering end of childhood begins with the footsteps of her father returning home in the early dawn hours bringing details of the civil war that has overwhelmed the streets of Phnom Penh, Cambodia's capital. Soon the family's world of carefully guarded royal privilege is swept up in the chaos of revolution and forced exodus. Over the next four years, Raami clings to the only remaining vestige of her childhood — the mythical legends and poems told to her by her father — and fights for her improbable survival. Displaying the author's extraordinary gift for language, *In the Shadow of the Banyan* is a brilliantly wrought tale of hope and transcendence.

NCCWSL Scholarship Winner Casey Madden

Casey Madsen was chosen to receive our AAUW branch scholarship to attend the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders. (NCCWSL) in June. Casey lives in St. Johnsville and majored in radiology technology while at FM. She graduated in May with an AS.

She was a member of Phi Theta Kappa, Student Government Association Trustee, and Member of Medical Imaging Student Organization. She received the Who's Who in American Junior Colleges Award and Distinguished FM Student Service Award.

Casey will be attending SUNY Albany in the fall to continue her studies in pre-med. Her goals are not only to be a doctor, but perhaps run a hospital someday. Casey drove to Maryland for the conference and met girls from around the country and did a lot of networking. She was particularly impressed with the Women of Distinction who were honored and spoke at NCCWSL. They included: Hattie Kauffman, TV anchor and news correspondent; Lily Liu. entrepreneur; Pamela Ann Melroy, NASA astronaut; DeRionne P. Pollard, President of Montgomery College in Maryland; and Judy Smith, founder and President of Smith & Company. She also heard Chelsey Clinton speak about the Clinton Foundation of which she is vice chair. We are hoping to have Casey Madsen share her experiences at one of our fall meetings.

The scholarship is given in memory of our 2013 NCCWSL scholarship winner, Santa Pumpura, who lost her life in an automobile accident this past March.

Fulton-Montgomery Communication College Award

Broadablin resident Sarah (Reynolds) Ralston was chosen as this year's recipient of the annual award to a Fulton-Montgomery Community College graduate. Ralston recently received an associate of science in business administration from FM. She plans to continue her studies in accounting and human resources this fall at Empire State College. Her goal is to open an automotive business with her husband, Mike, in which she would handle the office aspect of the business. Ralston attended Stillwater High School and graduated from Saratoga High School in 2000.

She attended Adirondack Community College for a brief time. Over the years, she has worked in a variety of jobs, including food service and house painting. While studying for her degree at FM, she worked at a deli in Ballston Spa. She recently began a full-time office position with Coretech Industrial. In addition to the scholarship Ralston received a Gift to a Grad membership.

Established in 1999 the \$500 award is given to a female non-traditional student graduate of FM who plans to continue her education to earn a bachelor's degree. Laurie Freeman chaired this award selection.

Dorothy Anderson Wemple Literary Award

Canajoharie graduate, Morgan Gray, was awarded the Dorothy Anderson Wemple Literary Award. To win the award, Gray was required to write a 300-to-500 word research or autobiographical essay on the topic "The Power of the Women's Vote." Gray will attend the State University of New York at Delhi in September. The \$300 award is given annually in memory of Dorothy, who was a former AAUW member and past judge for the essay contest, which began in 1991. Rosemary Leo-Pappas chaired this award selection.
