I paired up with another attendee and we took a Peddle Cab around the city. Our guide peddled us across the mall and shared some of the history behind DC and all of the monuments and dropped us off at a local restaurant famous for their crab cakes, and I could see why.

Public Policy

A Global update from the United Nations Foundation:

On June 1, the US House of Rep. passed the Girls Count Act, legislation which will support programs in Developing countries to improve birth registration & promote policies that prevent discrimination against girls. The US Senate previously passed the legislation, which now heads to Pres. Obama's desk to sign. When a girl is counted by her government, there is a greater chance that she will have access to education, health, and social services, and later in life be able to vote, work and own property.

President Obama signed into law the Girls Count Act

(S.802/H.R.2100) on June 12, 2015.

Tech Savvy Summit for Girls Follow-up

The FM Campus came alive on May 20 when 200 girls, 23 chaperones, 22 facilitator for 14 workshops, our capnote speaker and AAUW volunteers and guests joined for the Tech Savvy Summit for Girls. It was the best attended Summit for Girls - we had to feed 275 attendees including our volunteers and AAUW guests!

We were pleasantly surprised to have Kim Pollard, the AAUW National Regional Field Director for NY, NH and Maine attend to observe our Tech Savvy event. She visited the workshops, took photos and notes and has posted information about our branch including our display board, string gift bags for the girls and new AAUW stylus pens. In addition, 3 members of the Adirondack AAUW Branch traveled from Saratoga County to get ideas for holding their own similar Tech Savvy Summit.

The staff at FM was a great help with last minute tech needs. Darcelle Winchell and Amy Tucker at FM handled the college arrangements and Chuck Saul and Jason Radlin took care of our tech needs.

We really appreciated all the behind the scenes work by our AAUW members including folder prep by Ginni Mazur, Catherine Julius, Paula Lerner, and Terri Storti; gift bags Connie Chamberlain, day of helpers Bonnie Van Wie, Linda Zilka, Marie Wojeski, Gloria Kimball, Anya Biel. Linda Hammond undertook the difficult job of sorting 200 girls into 3 workshop choices out of 14 sessions. She produced class lists and name tags and ordered string bags that said AAUW Tech Savvy Girl.

Linda Bumpus solicited donations, applied for grants and obtained keynote speaker Gwendolyn Bluemich from GLOBALFOUND-RIES and P-Tech follow-up program for adults. This was very well received. School Counselor Jen Sponnoble brought 2 girls who were just completing their first year at the Pathways in Technology (P-Tech) program at Jansen Ave, Johnstown.

The girls attending the Summit were great. The workshops went well. We were very grateful to Lynda McMaster for recruiting presenters from SUNY Cobleskill and Rebecca Ortez for getting our Astronomy/Physics workshop presenters from Siena. We have looked over the evaluations and we have received many good ideas for future summits regarding workshop suggestions.

Looking ahead, the college has indicated that summer session will go back to the original schedule so we should not have as many hurdles as we did this year. Workshop presenters from past years are interested in returning and new presenters from this year are as well.

As costs for food go up we will have to address the possibility of increasing the registration fee or raising more money to put on the Tech Savvy Summit which now costs around \$6000. We would love to expand our Tech Savvy Committee next year and hope that when meetings start in the fall, you will step up to help.

We held a follow-up meeting on June 30th. Many new ideas and resources were discussed for our 2016 Summit.

Some back ground for our new members...

Last November we held a potluck dinner at the Fonda Reformed Church and our speaker was Pat Brookins who explained her work helping homeless women at the Haven of Hope Farm in Fonda. In preparation for the presentation we suggested an "all branch reading" of the books *A Framework for Understanding Poverty, A Cognitive Approach* by Ruby K.
