## Jahnn's Environmental Message....



Aside from methane caused by the cattle industry making up 51% of greenhouse gasses in the atmosphere, the consumption of meat is terribly bad for the environment in other ways, as well.

On the huge factory farms, the manure waste ends up in big cesspools, which flow into our rivers and aquifers. Cattle cause more than 10 times the amount of waste as the entire human population, and there are no sewage treatment plants of these feedlots, just cesspools. Cattle cause more than three times as much water pollution as the rest of the industries in the US. Every 24 hours, animals raised for the table produce 20 billion lb. of waste, or 250,000 per second. This waste produces methane gas. 100,000 animals on a feedlot contribute 3 billion cubic ft. of methane to the atmosphere per year. If

used, it would supply the natural gas needs for 30,000 people.

Over half the total amount of water used in the US goes to irrigate land used to grow feed for livestock. Enormous guantities are used to wash away manure. 2,500 gallons of water is used to produce | lb. of meat, enough water to serve a typical American family for a month. 100 times more water is used to produce I lb of beef as it takes to produce I lb of wheat. Over half the water consumed in the Northwest, an area of plentiful rivers, goes to livestock production, thus taking away from hydropower, necessitating the construction of nuclear power plants in the area. Estimate are that 17 billion KWH of electricity yearly are used by the cattle industry, enough to light every house in the nation for 1 1/2 months.

Land used for growing feed for livestock has been severely eroded, 4 million acres are lost to production yearly, an area the size of Connecticut, that's 60,000 lb of topsoil for every member of our population. 260 million acres of forest has been cut to replace this acreage. At this rate, we will be out of forests by 2037. Forests are the lungs of the earth, prevent floods, recycle and purify water, and are home to millions of species. However, by 1987, 1,000 species were going extinct yearly. In the 1990s, the figure was forecast to reach 10,000 yearly, and by 2017, 1 million species would be extinct. All life is intertwined, so where does this leave us?

Please, for the sake of our planet, ourselves, and the species we share this planet with, cut down on meat, or give it up altogether.



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## AGJ's Emerging Leader 2016 - Jennifer Garren

Jennifer Garren is the 2016 Emerging Leader of the AGJ-AAUW because of all she has done and continues to do for our branch. She joined in 2012 because she believes in the mission of advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research. She majored in Psychology and minored in Women's Studies and is a self-proclaimed Feminist.

She has been Public Policy VP, submitted articles to the Newsletter, advocated for Equal Pay Day and participated in a lobby day for the Women's Equality Act in Albany. Jennifer has attended NYS Summer Leadership Conferences as well as two NYS Conventions, each time chauffeuring several



members and returning with great program ideas. For our first major fund raiser for local scholarships, she was successful in obtaining business donations. She chaired a very significant program hosting Jennifer Lee, writer, speaker and filmmaker of the movie "Feminist Stories for Women's Liberation", a movie night and discussion open to the public at FMCC. She also headed a committee to bring Ronna Glickman to speak to the students of the Gloversville Middle School on topics of bullying, internet safety and cyber bulling. She participates in Lunch Bunch and Adelante book club and advocated the start of a new theater group.

#### Women in Politics—Victoria Woodhull

In 1872, Woodhull was the first female candidate for President of the United States. An activist for women's rights and labor reforms, Woodhull was also an advocate offree love, by which she meant the freedom to marry, divorce, and bear children without government interference.

At her peak of political activity in the early 1870s, Woodhull is best known as the first woman candidate for the United States presidency, which she ran for in 1872 from the Equal Rights Party, supporting women's suffrage and equal rights. Her arrest on obscenity charges a few days before the election for publishing an account of the alleged adulterous affair between the prominent minister Henry Ward Beecher and Elizabeth Tilton added to the sensational coverage of her candidacy. She did not receive any electoral votes, and there is conflicting evidence about popular votes.

Many of the reforms and ideals Woodhull espoused for the working class, against what she saw as the corrupt capitalist elite, were extremely controversial in her time. Generations later many of these reforms have been implemented and are now taken for granted. Some of her ideas and suggested reforms are still debated today.

The other panel members included a presenter from Jefferson County STEM event and the organizer from the Cortland branch program. It was interesting to see the perspective of each. The electrical engineering teacher who facilitated a workshop at the Jefferson County event showed us the circuit journals she used. They utilized copper tape like that used in stained glass art instead of wires. A drawing of a "doll house" could be "wired" so that the LED lights in each room would turn on and off. The organizer from Cortland branch told us how they used the National Tech Savvy Grant to fund their event and shared a sample of the bag they gave to each girl.

On Saturday night, it was exciting to hear our AGJ branch called as recipients of awards and to be there when our Emerging Leader Jennifer Garren was honored. There was also a moment of silence as the names of members who had passed were read. This included our own Nancy Reynolds.

On Sunday, members of each District met. Our District IV meeting was very productive, with many ideas being presented for the fall conference which will take place in Schenectady in October or November. Even though I didnt participate in the swimmathon this year I did stay up late to sing a song or two at the AAUW Funds Karaoke fundraiser. 


